

Young Stars Are Taking the NBA by Storm

Emergence of young talent in NBA

As we all know, all good things must come to an end. When it comes to professional sports, accepting the decline of one of your favorite athletes can be difficult to witness. For the true fans of the sport, it can also be viewed as a time of excitement due to the fact that new, undiscovered greatness awaits at the end of the tunnel of these aging professional athletes. Although you may never be able to relive the moments of LeBron James winning his first championship in Cleveland or Vince Carter putting his entire arm in the rim during a dunk at All-Star Weekend or Kobe Bryant scoring 81 points versus the Toronto Raptors, it is important to appreciate those moments for what they are: greatness. These memories can be hard to let go of; as a fan, it can be even more difficult to witness these same players age and decline in success on the court.

For the generation that grew up watching players like Dwyane Wade, LeBron James, Carmelo Anthony, Dwight Howard, Chris Paul and many more, times are beginning to get difficult as we are living through the process of watching all of our favorite players retire, decline in talent or athleticism. A lot of the players from the 2000s and 2010s are either out of the league or are taking a backseat to some of the younger, more exciting talent in the NBA.

The NBA today is mostly run by the youth. There are still exceptions that have yet to take a steep decline in their abilities on and off the court like: LeBron James, Stephen Curry and Kevin Durant. Specifically these three players are still at the forefront of the NBA; these three are still widely recognized as some of the best talent the NBA has to offer. LeBron being in his twentieth season is still dominating

the game when it matters most, Stephen Curry who just won an NBA championship and Finals MVP last season and Kevin Durant who just had one of the best individual seasons ever following an Achilles tear in the 2019 NBA Finals. But if one has been paying any attention this NBA season it is obvious the youth of the NBA are no longer afraid of these mega-stars. All three stars are still performing at very high levels individually, while all of their teams are starting the season off struggling, to say the least. All three players have begun this season with losing records and are searching for answers to turn their seasons around.

While players like LeBron, Steph and KD are struggling, other, younger players are coming to the light and showing why they should be considered the best of the best moving forward. Some of the most notable young players who are taking the NBA by storm are: Jayson Tatum, Nikola Jokic, Luka Doncic, Ja Morant and Giannis Antetokounmpo. While none of these players are first or second year players, they are all approaching their prime years and it is showing in every category possible.

Jayson Tatum, who battled LeBron James in a 7-game series in the Eastern Conference Finals his rookie season, has finally started to find his footing as one of the league's best. He led his Boston Celtics to an NBA Finals appearance last season in which he beat the Kevin Durant-led Brooklyn Nets, the Milwaukee Bucks and the Miami Heat before losing in the Finals to the Steph Curry-led Golden State Warriors. His route to the Finals was one of the most difficult in recent memory as he had to defeat some of the best talent in the NBA; he did so by averaging an outstanding 25.6 points per game, 6.7 rebounds per game and 6.2 assists per game in the 2022 NBA Playoffs. Tatum has begun the 2022-2023 NBA season with even more aggression and assertiveness with averages of 32.3 points per game, 7.2 rebounds per game and 4.1 assists per game. It is obvious Jayson Tatum is just entering his prime and will be around for a long period of time.

Nikola Jokic is the reigning back-to-back NBA MVP. Last season his team, the Denver Nuggets, were depleted by injuries but this did not stop Jokic from winning his second NBA MVP award and leading his team to the Playoffs, where they were defeated by the eventual NBA Champions. Jokic is one of the more unorthodox players the NBA has ever seen. With not an ounce of athleticism in his body, he still finds ways to dominate the game of basketball with his high-level playmaking, his difficult shot-making ability and his ability to make his teammates better. Last season, Jokic averaged 27.1 points per game, 13.8 rebounds per game and 7.9 assists per game. While his scoring and rebounding numbers are not as high as last season's, Jokic looks forward to prioritizing winning as his team has gotten healthy and he has his stars back to help him in hopes of an NBA championship this season.

Luka Doncic's greatness is completely undeniable. From the amazing stat-lines he produces on a nightly basis to the ultimate showmanship he serves every time he steps on the court, all NBA fans can agree that Luka is next up. Ever since Luka stepped foot on an NBA court his rookie season, he has been hitting big shot

after big shot, beating up on the older players of the NBA. A lot like Jokic, Luka is not very athletic at all but his pure skill and basketball IQ are what separate him from the rest. Luka has been playing professional basketball since he was 15 years old, though, and this is why he was able to dominate right away after being drafted in 2018. Luka is nothing less than a basketball prodigy as he has only averaged less than 25 points per game for one season, and that was his rookie season. He currently leads the NBA in scoring and is showing no signs of slowing down. The league is still scrambling trying to find ways to slow Luka down. Good luck, NBA.

Ja Morant is the underdog story that everyone loves. Ja Morant did not come from a big basketball school like Duke or North Carolina. He came from Murray State, which a lot of people had no idea of before Ja put Murray State on the map. His quick emergence in college led to Morant being picked second in the 2019 NBA draft behind Zion Williamson, who is an emerging superstar in his own right. Ja Morant is an ultra-athletic 6'2" point guard who plays for the Memphis Grizzlies. Ultra-athletic is almost an understatement when it comes to Ja. But he is much more than his jumping ability; he has made the Memphis Grizzlies one of the more feared teams in the NBA, especially when the Playoffs come around. Last season, he also lost to the Golden State Warriors in the second round of the Playoffs, but some fans may say they would have never lost if Ja Morant had not gotten hurt during the series. The World may never know, but what the league knows is that Ja Morant and the Memphis Grizzlies are on the way and they are coming fast. Ja is currently averaging 28.8 points per game, 6 rebounds and 7 assists per game. With one of Ja's known flaws being his ability to shoot three pointers, he is currently shooting 41% from three and this goes to show what type of player Ja is. He will only get better and that is bad news for anyone not playing for the Memphis Grizzlies.

Lastly, Giannis Antetokounmpo is the most dominant force in basketball since Shaq. He is a 7-foot, 250-pound force to be reckoned with when he is playing basketball. A lot of fans and players have mentioned how Giannis lacks skill and have illustrated how that will hold him back in the long run. But when one is able to literally just dunk over any and everyone it is hard to see a league where Giannis is not one of the best. He has found success in his style of play, utilizing his size and strength on every single possession, which has gotten him an NBA MVP award, a defensive player of the year award, an NBA finals championship and NBA finals MVP. So it is hard to say Giannis is having trouble finding success in this league. Plus his skill has improved every year, undoubtedly. Giannis has the chance to be recognized as one of the greatest ever if he continues this timeline of greatness that he's currently on.

All of these players have learned from the previous superstars of the NBA and have added their own spice to their greatness. The NBA is thrilled to be such a flourishing league, and the talent of the NBA will only get better with players like Paolo Banchero, Victor Wembanyama, Scoot Henderson starting their path to greatness as well. The NBA will be in good hands for years and years to come.

2AM Thoughts


It's been an eternity

Shares things that most people may not know or understand about our university.


